## Another fabulous county fair

Although the opening day of the fair, Thursday, June 19, brought almost 1.5 inches of rain in Fessenden, it didn't dampen the fair-going spirit of the county. Sunny skies followed and people came out.

The Wells County Fair Board is pleased with the assessments. Fair Board member Michelle Jensen reports that attendance was very good.

"All the events through Sunday afternoon brought a full- or nearly full-house," she said. "We feel very good about how everything went. The parade on Saturday was the largest parade we've had in years. We had 45 entries followed by 40 tractors from the 5th Annual Mid-Dakota Tractor Trek that drove in from south of Harvey."

"We love feedback from our communities," Jensen said. "We are open to ideas and suggestions and welcome contact from fairgoers. The Wells County Fair Board may be contacted through Facebook, their webpage, or email: [wellscountyfair@gmail.com](mailto:wellscountyfair@gmail.com).

Wells County NDSU Extension Agent Lindsay Maddock reports a successful fair from her 4-H perspective, as well. "Everything went smoothly," she said. "We had 374 static entries judged, and 110 animals in the barns."

"4-H participant numbers are holding across the county and these numbers are very comparable to previous years," she added.

Maddock said the new siding on the 4-H barn turned out well. 4-H shared the expense with the county on a 20:80 percent split. 4-H also paid to have the hog and calf pens rebuilt. "This was an important piece of the barn fix to keep everything safe and secure. It's better for the animals and for the spectators," she said.

Every year honorary 4-H members are named and recognized for their commitment and dedication as leaders to 4-H over the years. This year's recipients of the award were Donna Rau, of Fessenden, and Cheryl Flick, of Chaseley.

Saturday's Rhubarb Fest in the Festival Hall was attended by about 250 people and, according to chairman Janice Kanwischer, about \$800 was raised. These funds will be used to purchase replacement panels for the fence around the racetrack. "People

are so generous," she said. "Knowing that the money was going to the fairgrounds, some patrons donated more than \$100 for a piece of rhubarb dessert." Read some of the recipes on the the Herald-Press website, [www.heraldpressnd.com](http://www.heraldpressnd.com).

Law enforcement reports that there were no serious problems. Wells County's three officers in the sheriff's department, the city patrol, and additional hired officers worked to ensure adequate

patrol of the fairgrounds.

Sheriff Johnny Lawson said that he and Deputy Travis Tesch dedicated their time solely to the fair, while Chief Deputy Jeff Roehrich was assigned to regular patrol for the rest of the county. Lawson said that Fessenden's Chief of Police Larry Hoffer was a great help at the fairgrounds and was there on a regular basis.

Three additional law enforcement officers were hired to assist on the fairgrounds. Arlan Swan-

son of McHenry County Sheriff's Office, Henry Head, of the Foster County Sheriff's Office, and Darren Carter from the Carrington Police Department were a also great help, Lawson said.

Lawson continued, "It was helpful that the extra officers were actual licensed and active law enforcement, rather than security officers. It was great to see people out having a good time, supporting the Wells County Fair, without any trouble."

## North Dakota reaches oil milestone

The big news, both for North Dakota's oil industry and the state of North Dakota, is that April's production numbers have been tallied and reveal that North Dakota has finally reached the milestone of producing over one million barrels of oil per day.

"Reaching the one-million-barrel-a-day mark is a tremendous and timely milestone for the petroleum industry and our state," states North Dakota Sen. John Hoeven.

This is a milestone that the North Dakota Industrial Commission has been anticipating for quite some time. Production in early 2014 was hampered by an extremely cold North Dakota winter and the shutting down of the Tioga Gas Plant for the purposes of expanding its gas capturing ability in order to reduce flaring. But in April, North Dakota finally reached a level that not many oil-producing states or countries have reached.

"It is big news when you look at the world of crude oil production," states Lynn Helms, director of Mineral Resources for the North Dakota Industrial Commission. "Only three states have ever exceeded producing one million barrels of oil a day - California, Alaska and Texas. But only Texas is still producing at that level."

Helms further states that the Canadian province of Alberta also produces over one million barrels of oil per day. And that of the 115 countries in the world that produce crude oil, only 20 of them produce at or over the level that North Dakota just reached.

Additionally, Sen. Hoeven believes that the recent events in Iraq, Syria, Ukraine and elsewhere in the world continue to teach us that we must build our domestic energy resources and reduce our reliance on Middle Eastern oil to strengthen America's national and economic security.

"We celebrate and congratulate all who have worked so hard to bring North Dakota to this historic watershed," states Hoeven.

According to the North Dakota Industrial Commission, North Dakota produced a total of 1,001,149 barrels of oil per day during the month of April. It was an increase of almost 24,000 barrels over the month of March, which is why Helms does not believe we have yet seen the big surge in production the Industrial Commission has been expecting.

"April was not a particularly great month. We lost three days due to a big rain storm and load restrictions on county roads. And there were nine to 11 days where

the wind blew hard for completion activity," states Helms. "We ended April with 600 wells waiting to be tracked."

Helms believes that there are larger increases yet to come as the production numbers for May and June roll in.

North Dakota also produced 1,133,742 MCF per day of natural gas.

McKenzie County was still the leader of oil and natural gas production among North Dakota's oil and gas-producing counties. However, the April numbers were actually lower than what McKenzie County produced in March.

In April, McKenzie County produced a total of 9,576,841 barrels of oil and 14,286,047 MCF of natural gas. That is roughly 319,228 barrels of oil per day and 476,201 MCF of natural gas a day. These numbers are approximately 100,000 barrels of oil and 100,000 MCF of natural gas less than what was produced in March in McKenzie County.

On top of reaching a milestone in oil production, Helms states that oil prices are incredibly good. While this fact is likely due to the unrest in the Middle East, it only adds to the news of North Dakota's oil production.

"Currently, tax collections from oil and gas production in the state of North Dakota exceed \$10 million a day," states Helms. "That is a lot of money to be spent on infrastructure in the state."

With regard to flaring, Helms also states that he has not seen the drop in flaring he has been hoping for. But that is largely due to the fact that the Tioga Gas Plant was not fully online until the end of April.

"In April, flaring stayed at around 30 percent, but we should see improvement in gas capture

and flaring as we total May's numbers," states Helms.

At the beginning of the month, the North Dakota Industrial Commission began requiring gas capture plans along with permit requests, to continue the work of reducing flaring and achieve 90 to 95 percent gas capture by 2020. On July 1, the Industrial Commission will begin collecting gas capturing plans for wells that have already been completed and have been producing oil.

Helms states that permitting activity is still strong, and the state's rig count is stable at 190 rigs.

Finally, the Environmental Protection Agency has declared that they propose to make a rule based on a petition filed by Earth Justice and other organizations asking them to change their chemical disclosure policy.

Helms states that North Dakota adopted its chemical disclosure policy, Frac Focus in 2012, and the state is a strong supporter of it. The state feels that changing from Frac Focus is ill advised and is inviting all concerned parties to make comments on the Federal eRulemaking Portal at [www.regulations.gov](http://www.regulations.gov). All comments are due by Aug. 18, 2014, by 5 p.m.

Despite the fact that flaring regulations are being put in place by the state, and the federal government is again talking about putting regulations in place regarding hydraulic fracturing, Helms is confident that North Dakota will remain producing at the one-million-barrel-per-day level.

"We have been seeing a consistent two to three percent increase per month in production," states Helms. "And the permit and drilling activity indicate that we will continue to see growth well above one million barrels per day."

## Be a "Ready Traveler"

Canada Day and U.S. Independence Day

U.S. Customs and Border Protection reminds travelers planning trips across the border during the holiday weekend to have proper documents and heavy traffic.

CBP encourages travelers to plan trips in advance and to obtain a valid, acceptable travel document, such as a passport, a U.S. passport card, a trusted traveler card (NEXUS, SENTRI, Global Entry or FAST/EXPRES), a permanent resident card or an enhanced driver's license. Possession of these documents will expedite entry into the United States and make future border crossings more efficient.

Border traffic volumes are expected to significantly increase during the weekend of Friday, June 27, and continue through Monday, July 7, for the observance of both Canada Day and Independence Day. All travelers are reminded of a few simple steps they can employ to cross efficiently.

1. Check the new CBP informational website. It has been redesigned to help users quickly access the content they need. It also is optimized for access by smart phones and makes use of a new content delivery network that will improve access internationally.

2. Cross during off-peak times, such as before 6 a.m. or after 3

p.m. Most lines at the border start building in the morning and carry on into early afternoon.

Monitor wait times for the ports of International Falls, Minn., and Pembina. Information is updated hourly and is useful in planning trips and identifying periods of light use/short waits.

3. Have the correct travel document accessible and ready to give to the CBP officer.

If you are a frequent international traveler and have not already become a member of a trusted traveler program, sign up now. For more information, visit CBP's Trusted Traveler site.

4. Travelers are required to declare all items being imported into the United States from Canada. If you are not sure about what to declare, ask the CBP officer.

5. Many fruits, meats, dairy, and poultry products are prohibited from being imported into the United States from Canada.

For more information, view Prohibited and Restricted Items.

6. Specific requirements must be met to import or export firearms and ammunition to/from the United States. For more information on the importation or exportation of firearms and ammunition visit ATF, State Dept., and Commerce Dept. websites or contact CBP at 701-825-5800.

That made perfect sense to Evie and it makes perfect sense to me. Twelve kittens are cute, but wow, that's a lot of cats.

## Get them hooked on fishing

Over the years I've detailed my successes and failures of getting my kids "hooked on fishing."

Call me a bit disconnected, but I don't see how kids cannot enjoy fishing. And I've never heard my kids say they don't want to go fishing.

It's actually the complete opposite, as no matter the day or weather, they'd prefer fishing to about anything else.

Or course, along the way we've

had mishaps, snags, wet feet, cold fingers and soggy snacks, but the memories continue to grow each year. And now, truthfully, we're finally turning the corner to where I can actually fish a bit myself, in addition to helping rig up, bait hooks and troubleshoot tangled lines and snags.

It does seem like just yesterday when they landed their first fish all before turning 3, and they've probably all landed more fish than dad since then.

I've found the key to attracting and holding a child's interest in fishing is repetition. Just taking a child fishing once doesn't mean they will immediately develop an interest. My goal is to provide my kids with enough time next to the water so they'll enjoy angling to some degree over the course of their life, and balance it without ever having them complain, "Do we have to?"

They don't need to become master anglers or ever land a legitimate whopper. For us, it's about fishing, spending time outdoors, having fun casting and retrieving, and most importantly, developing relationship and memories.

Like many things in life, there are trade-offs. I'll gladly walk in their shoes for awhile if it means a chance to follow their footprints, exploring when the fish aren't biting or having their attention

diverted by a frog, toad or turtle. It's up to the adult to make sure the outing has an element of fun for the child, even if it is not so fun for the adult.

Since all children are different, for either boys or girls you need to find out what their comfort level is when it comes to weather. One child might enjoy slopping around in the rain while another might hate it. The stereotype is that boys would be more into the slopping around, but that's not always true. And sometimes I find myself mulling a bit too much over whether it's too cold, hot, windy or even sunny, and my kids are a good reminder to focus on the fishing not on the forecast.

As the kids grow older, the fishing outings compete with the usual elements of school and activities. And with each outing, I try to emphasize the positives of fishing, even when it's slow.

If the fish are not on the bite, and the attention span is waning, don't press your luck. Give yourself a cut-off and stick to it. And don't forget some sort of emergency diversion, such as a butterfly net or maybe a magnifying glass, to buy some time investigating the outdoors when the fish aren't biting.

A teachable opportunity is that the fish don't always bite, and that's really no different than the lesson that you don't always win in baseball or soccer either. It's more about the event than the ending.

My last thought is to end each trip on a positive note. For whatever the reason, if you sense a lack of enjoyment or enthusiasm, maybe a side trip for a burger or ice cream can create an association with fishing that just might be enough to coax another trip, and another ... and another.

## Is voter ID program worth \$700,000?

During the 2014 election cycle, North Dakota will be spending \$700,000 on advertisements to remind voters that they now need an ID to vote and that ID voting is as "easy as pie."

The first defense for spending this huge sum of money is that it is federal money. If this money had to come from the state treasury, it would never be spent. But we all know that federal money is cheap so we can spend it without justification.

In reaction to the frustration and guilt rising out of the 1992 election debacle in Florida, the federal government launched the Help America Vote Act to get the state and local elections systems cleaned up. North Dakota didn't need its election system cleaned up but we have been taking the money anyway.

Another defense for requiring IDs and spending \$700,000 is that we need to protect our election system from fraud.

If you believe that the North Dakota election system is fraught with fraud, I have a gunny sack and flashlight for you to go snipe hunting tonight.

Some years ago, I did a survey on election fraud in North Dakota for a nonprofit organization in

New York. They wondered how we got by without voter registration.

I solicited information from the election inspectors in our major cities and all 53 states attorneys. None of the inspectors reported fraud but one states attorney believed that felons were voting in his county.

I dismissed his allegation. It was speculative at best. If there were felons voting, he was the one responsible for prosecution. He didn't really believe it or he would have been acting on that belief.

(Of course, our statutes have been changed so felons now may vote upon completion of their prison time.)

In most states, politicians are carried away by partisanship in shaping election laws. During the recent legislative sessions held in most states, the Republican legislatures passed laws to restrict voting and Democratic legislatures passed laws to liberalize voting.

Both parties are hoping to win or lose elections through manipulation of the election laws. In some states, it may make a significant difference but not in North Dakota.

Let's look at precinct consolidation for an answer. We have

reduced the number of voting precincts in North Dakota from 2,500 to less than 500 over the past 40 years.

At one point, I studied comparable precincts in several counties and found that consolidation was not discouraging people from voting. This tells us something about the North Dakota voter.

The explanation for this persistence can be found in our political culture. Early settlement demanded self-reliance and rugged individualism. It is in our genes.

Our political institutions were shaped to accommodate participation. Any effort to reduce citizen involvement has failed, e.g. legislative efforts to curtail the initiative and referendum, reduction of the number of counties or

townships, or elimination of state officials.

Because of our culture, barriers to voting, including the ID requirement, will be overcome by most North Dakotans.

So is it prudent to spend \$700,000 in taxpayer money to promote the ID requirement that may be "easy as pie" but not as easy as when a voter without ID could swear out an affidavit and cast a ballot?

We could dismiss the significance of the ID regulations since it may disenfranchise only a handful of voters. However, even in those cases, maybe democracy for a few is still too important to cast aside for more convenient administration.

## Keller's decathlon team ranked in national top 10

The North Dakota State University men's track and field team placed 10th in the 2014 Webb Cup, an award presented by the Decathlon Association (DECA) to recognize collegiate track and field programs for overall success in the decathlon.

To determine which universities lead the nation both decathlon quality and quantity, points are awarded for the national rankings of two-man through eight-man teams. ## Freeze in the heat of summer

"Is my frozen turkey still safe to eat? It has been frozen for two years. I also found a roast at the bottom of my freezer, and I'm not sure how long it has been there. Is that OK to eat?" my caller asked.

"Let me ask you a couple of questions. Was your food solidly frozen the entire time? Did you have any power outages?" I responded.

"The freezer was on all the time," she replied.

"If the food remained frozen, it is safe to eat indefinitely. However, you probably will see some quality changes that affect the flavor and texture with long storage. If you see areas that are dry or discolored, that could mean that the meat is freezer-burned. That is a quality issue, not a safety issue," I replied.

"Would you eat it?" she asked.

"I probably would, but I might taste the turkey more often and add a marinade to the roast. Be sure to thaw it in the refrigerator. If it has off-odors after thawing, I probably wouldn't eat it, though," I added.

Food storage questions are common for NDSU Extension Service family and consumer sciences agents. No one likes to waste food because that is like throwing money in the trash.

Freezing is a convenient and versatile method of preserving meat, fruits and vegetables and also making your own "convenience foods" at home, but be sure to manage your frozen food inventory.

Consider posting an inventory sheet on the front or top of your freezer noting when you add or subtract foods from the inventory.

Unlike canning, which "steril-

izes" food, freezing does not kill bacteria. It simply stops them from growing. Upon thawing, any bacteria that were present "wake up" and grow if the food is allowed to thaw at room temperature.

Buying meat in bulk and repackaging in recipe-sized portions can stretch your budget at home. In fact, proper freezing is considered an excellent preservation method for maintaining the quality, color and nutrition of foods. Proper packing is of primary importance when freezing because exposure to air can promote flavor and color changes. Be sure to use moisture-proof wrapping paper or freezer bags.

Do you know how to do the butcher wrap, drugstore wrap and the casserole wrap?

To wrap meat securely using the butcher wrap, simply place the food at one corner of the freezer wrap, then fold the food and wrap over two times in the direction of the opposite corner. Fold the ends up and push the air out as you fold. With ends tucked, continue to fold food. Finally, pull the end tight and seal with freezer tape. Label the package with the contents and date you froze it.

If you decide to freeze your own casseroles and desserts, remember that foods such as celery and lettuce do not freeze well. Custards and sauces may separate during freezing. Be sure to slightly undercook pasta-based dishes such as lasagna prior to freezing to avoid mushiness.

Here's a recipe that can make three frozen meals for a family of four. Serve with rice or pasta, a side salad, fruit and milk for a balanced meal.

### Freezer Meal

#### Barbecue Meatballs

2 pounds extra lean (90 percent) ground beef  
2 large eggs  
2 c. quick oatmeal  
1 c. minced onion  
1 c. milk

1 tsp. black pepper  
Mix and make 72 walnut-sized balls. (Making them small allows the sauce to penetrate during the baking process.) Place in single layer in a large baking pan with sides.

#### Sauce:

3 c. ketchup  
2 c. brown sugar  
3 Tbsp. liquid smoke  
Mix sauce over low heat and pour half of mixture or less over meatballs. Bake at 350 F for one hour or until they reach an internal temperature of 160 F. Allow meatballs to cool, then place in freezer bags in meal-sized amounts (about six meatballs per serving). Add sauce to each bag, then freeze flat. Thaw in the refrigerator, then reheat in a microwave oven, oven or sauce pan, adding a little water if necessary. Serve over rice or pasta.

Makes 12 servings (six meatballs per serving). Each serving has 360 calories, 9 grams (g) of fat, 50 g of carbohydrate, 20 g of protein and 750 milligrams of sodium.

## NDSU evaluating unmanned aircraft technology systems

North Dakota State University researchers are taking to the air to monitor crop and livestock research projects on the ground.

Several researchers on campus are working with colleagues at NDSU's Carrington Research Extension Center to evaluate whether unmanned aircraft systems (UAS) can be effective management tools in crop and livestock production.

"There is currently much interest in using UAS in agriculture," says John Nowatzki, the NDSU Extension Service's agricultural machine systems specialist and the lead investigator on this project. "However, there is little research to show that UAS can be used effectively or economically for crop or livestock management."

Researchers are using UAS-mounted thermal, infrared sensors and cameras that capture image data at specific frequencies to collect data from fields and livestock at specified times.

The researchers plan to identify plant emergence and populations in corn, soybeans and sunflowers, and nitrogen deficiencies in corn and wheat. They're also hoping the UAS can help them make early plant health assessments, and spot disease and insect damage symptoms, weed infestations and indications of moisture stress on irrigated crops.

In addition, they plan to use the UAS to determine the impacts of tillage and crop rotations on crop emergence, vigor and yield, and the impacts of soil salinity on crop yields, as well as monitor the dry-down times of individual corn hybrids to determine when to harvest the crops.

"The objective is to find out which observations taken from the plane can translate into immediate management actions, or possibly some observations may lead to corrective action for the following season," says NDSU professor and Extension agronomist Hans Kandel, who is one of the project's co-investigators.

Crop production researchers have identified at least 40 research trials at the Carrington center they want included in the UAS project,

according to Blaine Schatz, the center's director.

"On the livestock side of our research efforts, we will mostly be observing the beef cattle within multiple projects, and the observations will focus on capturing images that may help to determine animal health contrasts and animal behavior patterns," Schatz says.

For example, researchers plan to monitor the breeding activity of the center's beef cattle, count the cattle in pastures to make sure they are where they are supposed to be, detect animals that are ill so they can be isolated from the rest of the herd and treated as quickly as possible, and identify animals that are aggressive toward other livestock or humans so they can be removed from herds.

The researchers also intend to monitor animal temperatures and determine the feedlot surface temperatures of various bedding materials to mitigate stress from extreme weather conditions.

"The individual NDSU Carrington Research Extension Center researchers will collaborate with project principal investigators to select appropriate sensors and monitoring schedules for their projects," Nowatzki says. "These researchers also will collaborate with ABEN (NDSU Agricultural and Biosystems Engineering Department) personnel to correlate the UAS-sensed data with the data collected on the ground for each project."

The first UAS flights were on May 5. The Federal Aviation Administration gave North Dakota approval in April for the UAS test flights.

A Research ND grant from the North Dakota Department of Commerce and a North Dakota Soybean Council research grant funded the project, Nowatzki says. The Research ND grant includes matching funds from two private-sector partners: the North Dakota Corn Council and LW Survey of Duluth, Minnesota.

The University of North Dakota's Center for Unmanned Aircraft Systems Research, Education and

Training is collaborating on this research by flying the UAS at the Carrington center. UND also will collect flight information from each flight of both UAS used in the project. The flight information will be shared with the FAA for its use in developing future UAS regulations.

In addition to finding out whether UAS are effective in monitoring crop and livestock production, the researchers plan to develop methods to convert the image data to information that's useful to producers and crop consultants, and help producers identify how they can make use of UAS on their operations.

"The major benefit of UAS is that it offers a very affordable technology that the farmers or consultants can easily adopt," says Sreekala Bajwa, NDSU ABEN chair and a UAS project co-investigator whose expertise is in remote sensing for precision agriculture. "It offers the flexibility that you can fly it anytime and at any area of interest with the proper safety regulations in place."

She thinks another huge advantage is that UAS potentially could cover a whole farm in a day or a few days and provide the producer with a visual of his or her entire field.

"Monitoring the entire farm is a very time- and labor-intensive job," she notes. "It is virtually impossible to look at all the field, even when a consultant is walking the fields. A UAS will allow the farmer or consultant to identify potential areas of concern and focus on those areas which may otherwise go undetected."

"With our current research project, we are only touching the surface of possibilities," Bajwa says. "Many researchers at NDSU are working in areas that can benefit from data collected from a UAS platform. I hope to see many more researchers taking active roles to capture this opportunity to address a research potential in their area of interest and, thus, positively impacting our state, region and nation in a significant way." 

## NOTICE TO WELLS COUNTY LANDOWNERS

RE: Highway Right of Ways  
No Encroachments, No Obstructions, No Injuries

Dear Landowner:

Wells County is hereby providing notice to all landowners with property along Wells County Highway Right of Ways that any landowner who encroaches upon county roads or ditches is liable to Wells County for any such encroachment, and it is a Class B Misdemeanor to injure or obstruct a Highway Right of Way. See NDCC § 24-05-23 (Encroachment), 24-06-27 (Penalty for Injuring ditch), 24-12-01 (Injuries to Highways) and 24-12-02 (Obstructing Highways). If Federal Funds were used on a road, the project agreements usually prohibit any kind of encroachment, and this is the main reason that Wells County is providing this notice. At this point, this is just a general notice to all landowners that own any property along a highway that we are going to enforce the various laws regarding Highway Right of Ways, specifically relating to encroachments, obstructions, and plowing up of any Highway Right of Ways.

Generally, County Highway Right of Ways are seventy-five (75) feet from the center line of any County Highway, but the Highway Right of Way may be more or less depending upon the Right of Way necessary for the Highway. If you are unsure of the specific feet of the Highway Right of Way along your property, please contact the Road Foreman, Mel Southard, to assist you in determining the actual amount of feet of the Highway Right of Way in the specific area. The Wells County Road Crew will be placing signs stating "Do Not Cultivate Highway Right of Way" and that there is a \$200 fee for tampering or removing the sign. It is a Class B Misdemeanor to injure any such highway signs. See NDCC § 24-12-04.

Wells County has noticed that there have been several violations relating to the Highway Right of Ways. The purpose of this notice is to inform landowners of the law, and to ask all landowners to abide by the laws, and to any landowners that were violating the law to quit violating the law, and make sure that there are no encroachments, obstructions and/or injuries to the Highway Right of Ways. Landowners are responsible to make sure that any renters are also following the laws relating to Highway Right of Ways because if there are any damages for any injuries, obstructions, or encroachments, the landowner is responsible for the damages, and the costs may be charged to the taxes levied against the real property. See NDCC § 24-05-23. Please note that "injury" to the Highway Right of Way includes, but is not limited to willfully digging up, removing, displacing, or breaking the Highway Right of Way. See NDCC § 24-12-01.
