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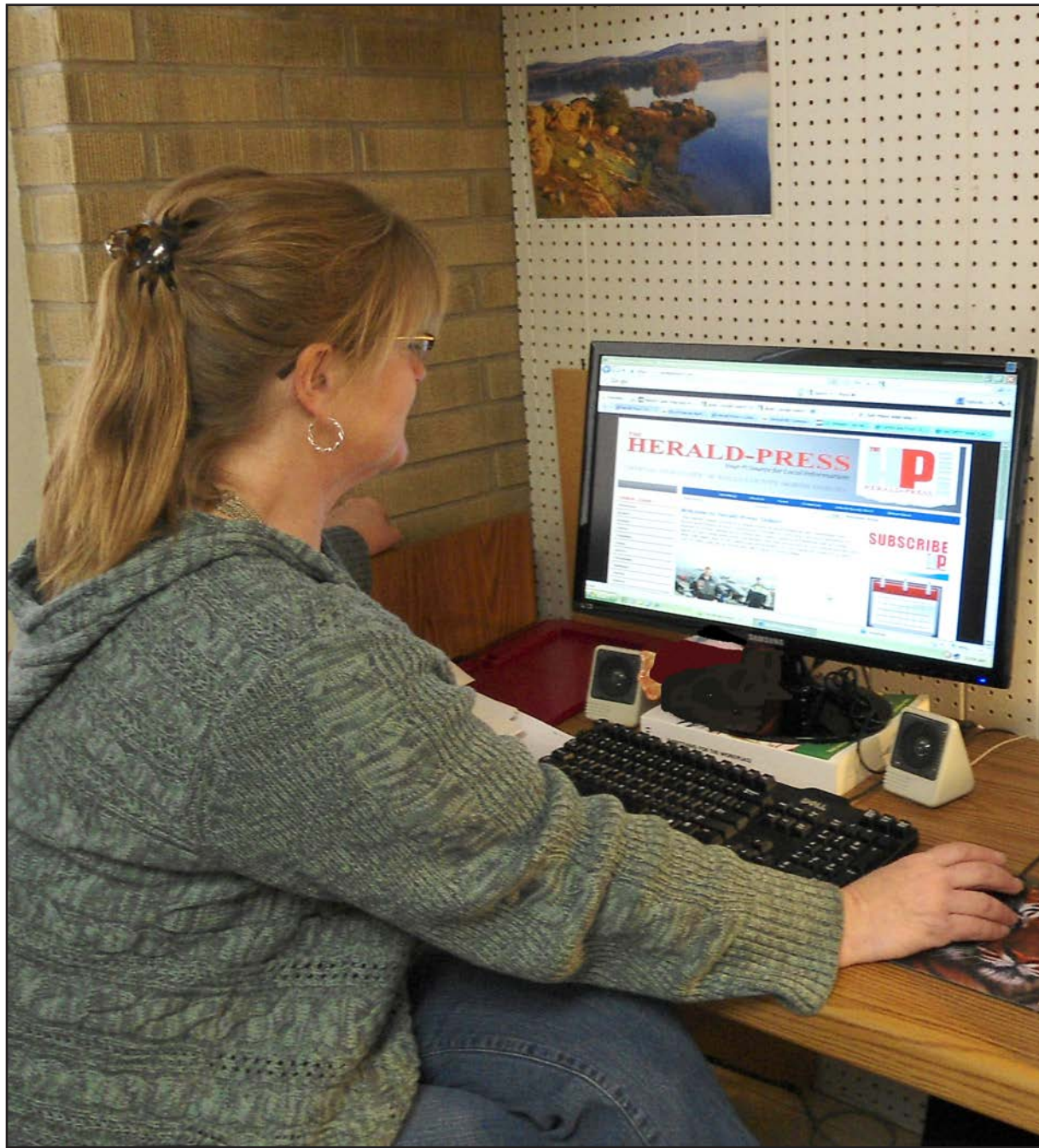

## H-P launches website, online subscriptions

Starting today, The Herald-Press offers an online edition as an alternative or supplement to our printed paper. The website, [www.heraldpressnd.com](http://www.heraldpressnd.com), will be more than just an online newspaper. The site includes a page for each of 18 local communities featuring a bit of each community's history, city information, links to respective web pages and current events. Many of the community sites feature drawings by Dorothy Miller, of Heaton. These drawings originally appeared in the 1984 Wells County Centennial souvenir book.

### It's your access point

"Our website also includes an events calendar that we will try to tie with each of the community and school calendars, as well as listings of meetings and special events," said Anne Ehni, who manages the website. "We want to provide one access point to things going on in and around Wells County and neighboring communities," Ehni added.

The website will evolve over the next couple months to include many facets of county information, city information, current events, school, weather, and road reports. Stories and news from each of the communities in and around Wells County will be sought and may be submitted electronically. Ehni is looking for contacts in each community to relay current events and news.

### Full editions online

The entire Herald-Press newspaper will be available for viewing to online subscribers at a rate of \$25 per year. Non-subscribers can still see headlines, access community tabs, and view the calendar, but the news for non-subscribers will be limited.

### Look it over

However, for two editions, January 28 and February 4, The Herald-Press Online will offer free access to the newspaper so that anyone may view it. To access those weeks' issues on the website, enter the username TRIAL (all capital letters) and the word TRIAL (all capital letters) as the password. This promotional period allows patrons and advertisers to look the website over and give it a try. After February 10, this user name and password won't work and access to the online paper will be available by subscription only.

Your online subscription order and payment can be easily processed through the website's "Subscribe" tab on the home page. Current subscribers can choose to receive just the online edition, but must call the staff at The Herald-Press office at 701-324-4646 to cancel the mailed edition.

### We think you'll like it

Some customers may prefer the online subscriptions to the printed page. It will be less expensive than the traditional mailed newspaper, especially for out-of-state sub-

scribers, because postage costs will be eliminated. Another benefit for distant customers is that the online paper will be available Saturday morning - the same day that it is delivered to Wells County patrons.

Advertisers will also benefit from the online edition because subscribers will be able to view their ads in a timely fashion. Some of our distant customers who receive their papers through the mail don't receive their papers for many days after the paper is published. Timeliness of the online edition will be a good benefit for customers who live outside Wells County and for snow birds.

"We hope this website evolves into a leading resource for anyone who is looking for information about Wells County. We've tried to think of everything, but of course, we've missed something, I'm sure," said Ehni. "I want to stress that almost every page on the site includes a place to send comments or to submit photos and information. I hope people will use this option."

The Herald-Press Online is a great place to acknowledge and celebrate the accomplishments of each of our communities. Stories of long ago, announcements of events to come, recognizing those who have made a difference, these are all great ways to help keep everyone connected. ## Reading, writing and... wrestling?

WrestleMania and reading novels is the match-up for a reading competition and it is a winning combination for Josh Hoffer. He is this year's finalist in the 28th annual WrestleMania Reading Challenge for 2012.

Twenty finalists from across the country, including the 7th grader from Fessenden, will compete in Miami, Fla., for ringside tickets at WrestleMania XXVIII.

The challenge asked students grades 7 through 12 to read a book of their choice and write a letter that is only 100 words or less to persuade their favorite WWE star to read the book selected by the student. The students were also asked to commit to reading at least five books before selecting their book. Students are to go to the WWE website and decide which WWE personality is most like a character from the book they have selected. The objective of the program is to encourage reading with the trip to Miami, attendance at the WrestleMania XXVIII, and meeting the WWE stars as a reward.

Hoffer selected Randy Orton of the WWE as his persuasive letter's subject and choosing scenarios from the book, "The Adventures of Tom Sawyer", by Mark Twain to illustrate his point. Hoffer observed the comparisons of Randy Orton to Tom Sawyer as, "Tom Sawyer is tough doesn't give up and neither does Randy Orton," said Hoffer.

The next book that the students have to read for this challenge is "After Tupac and D. Foster", by Jacqueline Woodson. The students will study the book and participate in a "Reading Bowl"

quiz show game at the WrestleMania XXVIII and answer questions regarding the book. Points will be awarded to the participants who answer correctly. The author will also be present to discuss the book and sign copies for the students.

All finalists win \$2,000 for their school's library, airfare, ground transportation, three nights hotel for two, and tickets to WrestleMania XXVIII, plus \$300 in spending money. The Fessenden-Bowdon school's library will also receive a set of Penguin Young Readers books, donated by Penguin books.

Sandra Olschlager, FBHS Library and Media Specialist, is on the local panel of judges that selected Josh to represent Fessenden. "We are so proud of all of

our students and it is amazing that Fessenden has now had two finalists in back to back years. Caitlin Wolkenhauer was a finalist last year and went to the reading challenge finals in Atlanta, Georgia," said Olschlager.

Josh Hoffer's favorite book series is the action adventure books called "Conspiracy 365", by Gabrielle Lord. "It is about a kid that is a hunted fugitive and is trying to solve a conspiracy and each book is written about a specific month and there are 12 books in the series. It is like a mystery with adventure," said Hoffer.

Josh's adventure to Miami is in March and he plans to take his grandfather, Larry Hoffer, of Fessenden, along on the exciting excursion.

## New public transit bus purchased

A new 2011 15-passenger bus has been purchased by Wells-Sheridan County Aging Council. Bought with 80 percent government funding, the bus is now available for public transit.

Garnet Lukenbach, site coordinator for the Aging Council, said the remaining 20 percent of the bus' cost was raised locally by gaming proceeds from sites at JW's and Artos, and from the council's annual calendar raffle.

Bus driver Loretta Buchwitz said, "The calendar raffle sales help keep costs to the riders down because the money raised helps pay for gas and

upkeep."

In addition to trips around Harvey, the bus makes one monthly trip to Minot for a cost to the rider of \$20 round trip, and two monthly trips to Bismarck at \$30 round trip.

The council is looking for another driver who will work part time for the Fessenden meal site and make the out-of-town medical trips.

## I bet you didn't know

The timing couldn't be better. Right here in the nutty Republican primary, I discovered something almost as nutty as politics.

As most of you are probably aware, October 7-13 was National Squirrel Awareness Week. Maybe you missed it. If so, you probably also missed Squirrel Appreciation Day, which was January 21. Actually, I missed them both too.

Now, I'm a big fan of squirrels, but where do people come up with days and weeks like this? Are there people out there who believe squirrels are under-appreciated? Under-loved? Over-hated? Who knows, maybe the force behind the "appreciation" is the haters. There are lots of haters.

I don't think there were a lot of squirrels in central North Dakota when the pioneers arrived. Okay, there were Franklin Ground squirrels, but I'm talking here about real squirrels - tree squirrels. The lack of trees a century ago must have resulted in a lack of squirrels. Then came shelter belts, and with them came squirrels.

I was surprised to find squirrels in Wells County, in fact, in the city of Fessenden. In fact, they were in the soffit of my house - actually, not IN the soffit, but through the soffit and into the cozy space beneath the eave. Two such miscreants ended up in my frying pan.

I was also surprised to find the Wells County squirrels were mostly, maybe all, fox squirrels. The rusty colored, large cousins of the gray squirrel. In more forested country, where I grew up and where I live now, the grays are much more common than the fox squirrels. And in these parts fox squirrels are mostly found in farm woodlots near corn fields. Maybe they knew corn was coming to Wells County. Gray get along just fine without corn, so they live in the forests and in the cities.

Completing the list of upper Midwest squirrels are red squirrels and flying squirrels. Both are much cuter than reds or grays, and much smaller. But they're just as mischievous. Squirrels are rodents. They gnaw wood. Beavers are rodents, too. We've had squirrel problems here in the woods, too. Many years ago one got into the cabin while we were away and chewed up all the window sills trying to get out. It died of starvation in the wood bin. Others have come down the fireplace

chimney - while we were home, but when there was no fire. Glass doors kept them in the fireplace, but those doors have to be opened to get them out. That was fun. We've also had them in the attic.

In addition to being invasive, squirrels are also ingenious robbers of sunseeds in the bird feeders. This year, for the first time, I have our feeder set far enough from tree branches that squirrels can't make the prodigious jump and pig out on the goodies. I've had to take more branches off a pine tree from which previous de-branching has proved inadequate.

But for all their irritation, I do like squirrels. Always have. My granddad used to take me squirrel hunting, and I still have his .22 WRF squirrel gun. A squirrel has frequently been the first blood our kids and grandkids have drawn. But most of all, they're delicious. I believe they're the best eating of all wild game. It takes a few to make a meal, and they're miserable things to butcher, with skin about as tough as a deer's. But browned and simmered in a frying pan, there's nothing better.

In fact, they're so delicious, I still have hopes that some day Marion will try eating one.

## Sage grouse research

Because of a long-term population decline throughout their native range, in 2010 the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service considered listing sage grouse under the Endangered Species Act.

Since sage grouse inhabit the extreme southwestern part of North Dakota, this development was of particular interest within the State Game and Fish Department. Listing under the ESA basically means the federal government, specifically the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, would assume primary sage grouse management instead of the states.

The FWS determined that listing was warranted, but other species had a higher priority for federal recovery efforts. However, the FWS is scheduled to revisit sage grouse listing again in 2015, and at that time, one of the determining factors will be whether a regional sage grouse management plan is in place.

The effort to develop that plan is just getting started across the western United States, with public meetings in all states in the sage grouse range. The U.S. Bureau of Land Management is leading the effort, because more than 50 percent of the nation's sage grouse are found on BLM land. In North Dakota a majority of the state's sage grouse, and the largest leks, are found within BLM land in Bowman County, according to Aaron Robinson, Game and Fish Department upland game biologist.

Robinson participated in North Dakota's public meeting in Bowman in mid-January. He says the

next step is for the states and federal agencies to work through the public comments and build them into a comprehensive range-wide management plan that provides for sage grouse conservation and protection by late 2014.

Game and Fish Director Terry Steinwand says that while North Dakota is on the periphery of the sage grouse range and doesn't have many of these native birds compared to states farther west, the state still has an important role in the long-term recovery plan. "Sage grouse have had a rough time the past decade or more, not just here, but in all Western states where they exist," Steinwand said. "We're committed to using whatever resources we can to help get those birds stabilized and headed in the other direction."

In North Dakota, Steinwand added, a number of projects are already underway.

Highlights of Game and Fish involvement over the past several years include:

Game and Fish has funded research over the past six years to determine species demographics such as survival, nest success, bird movements and reproduction success.

Helped form a working group, in conjunction with a core group of local landowners, to provide information to agricultural producers about sage grouse conservation.

Worked closely with the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service and BLM on extensive sagebrush plantings designed to connect

fragmented areas and provide incentives to local landowners.

Provided funding and piggybacked with federal programs to provide incentives for private landowners to implement grazing practices that increase residual grass cover that benefits sage grouse.

"We're going to continue our efforts, in cooperation with other agencies and private landowners, to work on projects to benefit sage grouse," Steinwand said. "It's in the best interest of all the states in sage grouse range to keep these birds off the endangered species list."

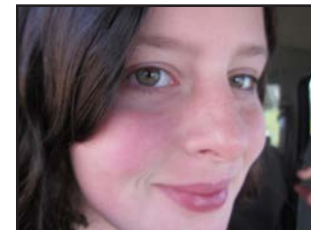
Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Mehlhouse of Fessenden were Sunday afternoon visitors at the Sherman Westby home of rural Bowdon.

## Prairie Fare

### Thawing meat

Meat is among the most perishable of foods. It is high in protein and moisture. Bacteria that are present prior to freezing can grow quickly when they are exposed to warm temperatures.

Thawing meat in the refrigerator is one safe defrosting method. Can you name three ways to safely thaw frozen meat? Pause for a minute and think.

Did you think of thawing in a microwave or under cool water and cooking from the frozen state?

Although it takes a little planning, refrigerator thawing is an easy method. Place your item in a container. Never place a package of frozen meat on a shelf immediately above ready-to-eat foods such as lettuce. You do not want to risk dripping meat juices on foods that will not be cooked.

If you are thawing a turkey or a large roast, you should allow about 24 hours for every 5 pounds of food. A pound of ground meat usually takes most of a day to thaw.

If you thaw meat in the refrigerator, you do not need to cook it immediately. According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, refrigerator-thawed ground meat will remain safe and of good quality for two days, while red meat cuts (roasts, steaks and chops) will retain good quality for up to five days in a 40-degree refrigerator.

Food that is thawed in the refrigerator can be refrozen safely, although you lose some quality. For example, the cooked product may be less juicy. Meat that is still partially frozen (as evidenced by ice crystals) usually results in a higher-quality end product after refreezing.

You can thaw packaged meat under cold water. Place the food in a leak-proof plastic bag, and be sure to change the water every 30 minutes. When defrosted this way, a pound of ground meat may thaw in about an hour. Larger packages may take about two to three hours to thaw.

If your plans suddenly change and you will not need to use the meat that you just thawed under cold water, remember this: Food that is thawed under cold water should be cooked prior to freezing. Be sure to package it in freezer wrap, freezer bags or containers in recipe-sized amounts.

You may have thought of microwaving as a defrosting method because most people have this appliance. Be sure to cook microwave-thawed food immediately.

Many times, microwave-thawed food becomes warm or may even cook partially during the defrosting time.

Finally, you can safely cook food that is frozen, but remember that it will take at least 50 percent longer to cook the food.

If you have a package of frozen ground beef, you may want to thaw it and try this recipe. You will have homemade sauce in about 30 minutes. You can freeze the leftovers in meal-sized amounts for later use.

### Homemade Meat Sauce

- 2 tsp. salad oil (such as olive, canola or sunflower oil)
- 1 large onion, finely chopped
- 1 large carrot, finely chopped
- 1 stalk celery, finely chopped
- 4 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 Tbsp. Italian seasoning
- 1 pound lean (90 percent or leaner) ground beef
- 1 28-ounce can crushed tomatoes
- 1/4 c. chopped flat-leaf parsley (optional)
- 1/2 tsp. salt (optional)
- 1/2 c. grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 pound whole wheat spaghetti

Rinse and prepare vegetables as indicated. Heat oil in large skillet over medium heat. Add onion, carrot and celery and cook, stirring occasionally, until onion is beginning to brown (5 to 8 minutes). Stir in garlic and Italian seasoning; cook until fragrant, about 30 seconds. Add beef and cook, stirring and breaking up with a spoon until no longer pink. Drain excess fat. Increase heat to high. Stir in tomatoes and cook until thickened, 4 to 6 minutes. Stir in parsley if desired and salt. Keep warm. Cook and drain pasta. Serve sauce over the pasta and sprinkle with cheese.

Makes 8 servings. Each serving: 389 calories, 9 g fat, 53 g carbohydrate, 28 g protein, 9 g fiber, 416 mg sodium, 709 mg potassium.

## Cramer confounds GOP nominating process

By announcing that he will bypass the Republican endorsing convention and go straight to the party primary in his quest for a U. S. House seat, Public Service Commissioner Kevin Cramer has thrown the party endorsing process into turmoil.

After accepting five prior endorsements for public office by conventions, he has made this decision to break away from a convention endorsement for several obvious reasons.

First, he remembers that he lost the U. S. House endorsement in the 2010 convention and he doesn't want that to happen again. Sizing up his chances in the 2012 convention, he has concluded that he may not be able to beat the other five candidates vying for the endorsement.

Second, he has better statewide name recognition than any of the other Republican candidates for the endorsement. He has served in as a Public Service Commissioner since 2003 and has run for the U. S. House twice.

Third, he has amassed a big campaign chest. He has enough money to finance a stronger primary campaign than any of the other candidates.

His unilateral decision leaves the Republican convention and the five other announced candidates in a quandary.

If the Republicans want to retain their self-respect as a party, they can't let Cramer dictate the terrain for the race. They certainly must endorse a candidate.

Of course, they could declare an open primary and encourage one and all to join Cramer on the primary ballot. However, that would be playing Cramer's game because Cramer holds the biggest cards in the game - name recognition and money.

If the convention endorses a candidate, the party would be obligated to give that candidate the utmost of support to defeat Cramer. To endorse a candidate and abandon him/her would be unthinkable.

This means that the Republican Party will be forced to invest thousands of dollars in a U. S. House race that it would otherwise put into Rick Berg's U. S. Senate race.

Another consideration. The five other announced candidates may reconsider their availability if they are going to be forced into a hard-fought primary campaign even though backed by a convention endorsement. For sure, running in the primary would require massive amounts

of time and a significant personal financial commitment.

While Cramer may have the benefit of name recognition and a fat treasury, his move will cost him dearly in party good will. That will trim more than a few votes from his tally. If he should win the nomination in the primary, he may find it difficult to fire up party enthusiasm for the fall campaign.

Republicans are better than Democrats at closing ranks after bitter disagreements but there will be a considerable number of Republicans who will sit on their hands in a Cramer campaign. They will feel that they have the luxury of sitting out the campaign because the Republicans will surely keep the Congressional seat since the Democrats are fielding a candidate who does not have statewide recognition or significant funds.

After accepting a convention endorsement five times, this is no year for Cramer to question the legitimacy of the convention nominating system even though North Dakota has had a primary system since 1908 that is open and available to anyone who can round up a handful of signatures to get on the ballot.

We may have an open primary in the law but we are a convention state. This has benefited candidates who lack the personal resources to run statewide primary campaigns on their own. In other words, money is not a prerequisite for getting into politics in North Dakota.

For that reason alone, conventions are worth preserving.

## Hornets knock off Raiders, lose at home to Cards

A strong second quarter fueled by three shots from behind the arc helped to propel the Harvey-Wells County Hornets to a 61-50 victory over the visiting Lakota Adams Edmore Raiders last Friday night in Fessenden.

By the play in the first quarter between the Hornets and Raiders, it appeared it was going to be a back and forth battle all game. HWC jumped out early to an 8-2 lead before LAE pulled back to within 10-8. HWC then went on a 5-0 lead and looked to have a comfortable lead after one quarter. A 5-0 run to end the first left HWC with a 15-13 lead after eight minutes. HWC left no doubt in the second quarter that LAE was going to need

a big second half if they wanted to compete with the Hornets on this night. The Raiders started mounting their comeback as they ended the quarter on a 7-2 run to trail 48-30 with eight minutes to play.

Having a big lead in the fourth for HWC was needed. The Raiders continued their aggressive play on the offensive and defensive ends. LAE opened the quarter on a 14-4 run drawing with eight points at 52-44. Field goals by Tucker Nordby and Marchus stopped the run and settled down the Hornets as they easily played out the remainder of the fourth and came away with an 11 point district 7 victory at 61-50.

Marchus led all scorers on the night tallying 22. Houchin and Nordby were also in double digits with 16 and 12 respectively. The 6-6 Nordby was also a strong force on the boards as he completed the double-double with 13 rebounds. Eric Haugland's 21 points led all Raider players while Garrett Skoheim chipped in with 12.

Statistically, the Hornets put up their best offensive numbers of the season. Making 4-10 from behind the arc and connecting on 24-41 from closer range rounds out to just over 47% from the field. Even though the team shooting was very respectable, the Hornets did commit 25 turnovers which is one of the highs for any HWC game this season.
